When we see a butterfly, it looks very beautiful. However, before it had that shape, it was just a caterpillar. That caterpillar isn't very attractive. It only becomes lovely *after* it changes.

Similarly, when people are in their sinful nature, they are all enemies of God and far from Him. But Jesus Christ is inviting all people to be changed into His image.

When we put faith in Jesus Christ and are willing to come and be His followers, He starts this transformation process. This change doesn't happen in one day. It's an ongoing process.

As we look closely at Jesus Christ's life, walk with Him, and obey His words, we are changed into His image.

The final goal for every believer in this world is to be changed into the image of Christ.

Peter's Transformation

One of the disciples, Peter, when called by Jesus, was a simple fisherman, an illiterate, given to emotional outfits. But as Peter was following Jesus through life situations, through dialogues, and through teachings, he became a chief

disciple, an apostle, and a vibrant miracle worker. In a way, he was transformed from a fisherman to fishers of men in the following areas:

1. From Timid to Bold

Peter once asserted to Jesus that everyone would desert Jesus, but he would not desert him. But when the actual hour came, 'Peter followed him at a distance' (Mathew 26:58). Peter was very timid and chose to follow Jesus 'at a safe distance'. He didn't want to be identified as one of the disciples of Jesus, for fear of Jews. But later he was testifying boldly before the Israelites, who were responsible for crucifixion, declaring, 'You killed the author of life, but God raised him from the dead. We are witnesses of this' (Acts 3:15). Once a timid Peter was transformed into a bold one.

2. From Impulsive to Firm

Peter was impulsive. He was the initiator of any discussion. He was the first one to raise questions, and he was the first one to answer. He speaks before he thinks. At the transfiguration of Jesus, two men were talking with Jesus.

As the men were leaving Jesus, Peter said to Him, "Master, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." (Luke 9:33). Then the Bible records, 'he did not know what he was saying'. Such was his impulsive nature. But later, at the council of Jerusalem, there was a dispute over circumcision. When the question for discussion came, Peter was not impulsive at this time. He concludes only after he heard the opinions of all others gathered there, 'after much discussion' (Acts 15:7). He was transformed to be assertive.

3. From Sleeping to Praying

At Gethsemane, Jesus was deeply distressed and troubled. At that time, he admonished his disciples to 'watch and pray'. But Peter, along with other disciples, was found sleeping. In a voice of anguish and sorrow, he said to Peter, 'Simon, are you asleep? Couldn't you watch with me even one hour? Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. (Mark 14:38). But this Peter was later admonishing the church to be alert as 'Your enemy, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour.' (1 Peter 5:8). He was transformed to be a man of prayer.

4. From Being Served to Serving

At the time when Jesus washed the feet of His disciples, Peter, in the beginning, resisted Jesus that he never wash his feet. But later, he allowed Jesus to wash his feet. Perhaps this incident of his master serving the disciples made a long-lasting impact on his mind. Later, he admonished the leaders of the church to be 'eager to serve' (1 Peter 5:2). It took a great transformation to be a man of service.

5. From Emotional to Principled

When Jesus was sought for in the garden, Peter drew the sword and cut off the right ear of Malcus, the high priest's servant. Peter did this out of emotion. But later, he admonished the church leaders to 'endure if you suffer for doing good' (1 Peter 2:20). Now he was going by the principle, not by emotions.

How Transformation is Possible

Transformation is possible in the lives of disciples if they are committed to following Jesus Christ. A timid, impulsive, and emotional person transformed into a courageous, principled, firm, and vibrant preacher and leader in the expansion of the kingdom of Christ. Jesus was so compassionate in dealing with Peter; he answered all the questions Peter asked, exercised perseverance in the process of his failures, forgave his betrayal when repentant, and finally made Peter understand the love of Jesus.

From Peter's side, he did his part as below:

- 1. He was willing to leave everything to follow Jesus (Mark 1:17).
- 2. He was willing to take a risk.
- 3. He acknowledged and confessed the supremacy of Jesus (Mark 8:29, Mat 16:14–17).
- 4. He learned lessons from his mistakes.
- 5. His repentance was genuine (Mark 14:72).
- 6. He confessed his love for Jesus, which made him feed the flock (John 21).

Are you willing to be a disciple of Jesus and allow Him to transform your life?

The name "Union of Evangelical Students of India" (UESI) reflects the original vision of its founders. One of the early staff members, Brother P.C. Varghese, used to travel even to the foothills of the Himalayas. A student he mentored during such visits has since been pastoring a church with her husband in the upper Himalayas. There were many such stories, but in the following decades, not much progress was seen in the ministry in North India.

Today, even after seven decades, UESI doesn't have a viable student ministry in the 13 states in the extreme north, above Madhya Pradesh. In this scenario, the southern states, where the ministry is stronger, have a mission mandate to reach these unreached states. So, let's try to understand the concept of tentmaking and its relevance to UESI's cross-cultural student ministry.

The word "tentmakers" appears only once in the New Testament in Acts 18:3. In the Old Testament, it simply refers to the physical activity of making tents. However, in the New Testament, it's understood in a figurative sense, as we see in Paul's life. Paul worked hard day and night - preaching the gospel during the day and making and repairing tents at night. At present, tentmaking has become a technical term used in missiology as a mission strategy to spread the gospel, particularly in areas where it cannot be easily preached.

Who is a UESI Tentmaker?

A UESI Tentmaker is a missionmotivated and self-supported disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ who has moved to a cross-cultural "needy place" and is involved in student ministry as their first priority. This is the definition provided by the TM Cell. UESI Tentmakers are those who intentionally move from their comfor table native culture to an unfamiliar, often harsh, cross-cultural situation to establish student ministry in pioneering areas. They have a long-term commitment, living in these needy places for many years. If the ministry becomes strong enough, they move to another needy place, either within the state or to another needy state.

Can any believer who migrates to a cross-cultural situation be conside red a tentmaker?

We can't deny that a person who has moved due to a new job, promotion, or transfer may also play the role of a tentmaker if they set the right priorities. However, the difference is that a tentmaker is always ready to shift to a new place, risking their career as guided by the Spirit of God. In contrast, someone who moved for a job is bound by the requirements of the organization they serve rather than the needs of the mission field, and so may not always be available to shift to a more needy place.

What are the advantages of this strategy?

A tentmaker gains great access to a variety of people who would otherwise be inaccessible. They find it easier to mingle with the community and build personal relationships due to their identity as a teacher, doctor, or businessperson. In turn, people also feel free to express themselves with the tentmaker, as they play the role of a colleague, teacher, or mentor. Hence, communicating the gospel happens in a more natural way within the society. The profession also becomes a justified reason for the tentmaker to live in that particular community for a long term, often for many years or decades.

Tentmakers usually work in loosely associated teams in a particular city or region. The pioneer tentmaker facilitates the movement of a few more tentmakers and builds the team. This enables the tentmakers to be "salt and light" in society. We see in Acts 18 that Paul moved from place to place within a city and from city to city, leaving behind local believers to carry on the ministry in his absence.

Is tentmaking relevant only for restricted countries?

Although it's more suitable for restricted countries, it's not a narrow idea. Rather, it's a broad-based and effective strategy for pioneering areas where the church doesn't exist.

Is tentmaking more suitable for urban student ministry?

Due to the inherent advantages mentioned earlier, it is best suited

for urban ministry. In urban areas, various career opportunities are easily available for tentmakers. In general, many UESI tentmakers take up teaching jobs for the sake of student ministry, but they can take any job suitable to their profile.

What career options are available for UESI Tentmakers?

Teachers at all levels, especially English teachers in many parts of North India; administrators in schools and other establishments; medical doctors and paramedics; technical jobs in factories; project engineers/ staff; field/administrative jobs in NGOs; and entrepreneurship. There is no dearth of opportunities.

Is tentmaking the only strategy for pioneering ministry?

Tentmaking is uniquely suitable for student ministry in unreached states, but it doesn't undermine any other strategy. Paul certainly believed it was right and proper that full-time servants of God be supported by believers (1 Cor. 9:14; 1 Tim. 5:17–18). Both strategies go together and complement each other.

How can we make graduates and students aware of these oppor tunities?

They should be given opportunities to hear firsthand from the tentmakers who have gone out from the state.

Additionally, this topic should be explored in local, regional, and state-level gatherings.

Conclusion

A tentmaker is a disciple of Lord Jesus, clear about their call to be a professional in another culture, using their skills to stay relevant in the community, preaching the gospel with words and deeds, loving the community they serve, being different in their career goals and the way they spend their salary, and always ready for a "marching order" to move to another needy place in obedience to the last command of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

When a decentralized state makes serious efforts in missions by sending tentmakers, it will also bring revival to the local ministry. An inward-looking church gets entangled in its own problems, but an outward-looking church is a mission-minded church, and it always grows. This applies to EUs and EGFs too!

There is a great vision rooted in God's heart. This vision is not just for the future; it's a higher plan that guides our every step right now. It shows God's endless love and will for humankind. When we give our lives to His vision, we become part of the Creator's great plan, not just working for ourselves. We find real meaning and satisfaction by understanding God's will and our role in it.

God's Two-Part Vision

The vision of God is always twofold. These two are deeply rooted in God's heart and reveal His eternal plan for humanity. One is the restoration of Israel, His covenant people, and the second is bringing the gospel to every nation, language, and people in the world.

- 1. Israel being rebuilt
- 2. Gentiles being saved

These two key parts of God's vision make clear how He sees His people and the world. The restoration of Israel shows He keeps His promises, and the salvation of the Gentiles shows how wide His grace is.

1. The Restoration of Israel (or God's People)

God has a deep concern for the Israelites; He wants them all to have a good relationship with Him again. In the Bible, they are often described as lamps that have gone out or lost their light. This situation isn't just about ancient Israel; it also applies to Christians today, especially the current generation of believers, like students and graduates, who may have once

had Christ's light but struggle to keep it burning in their ministry and personal lives. They are constantly lighting up and going out.

The text emphasizes that a lamp like this needs to be fixed. This is a personal duty. The Bible, however, gives a serious warning: if someone has received spiritual light, experienced Christ, and then falls away, it is extremely difficult, sometimes impos sible, to be renewed again (to repent and start a new life), according to the Book of Hebrews (Hebrews 6:4-6). This is not a lack of God's grace, but it shows how serious sin is and its results.

Some are returning to their old habits and worldly, sinful ways, like "a dog returning to its vomit or a pig wallowing in the mud" (2 Peter 2:22). God's heart is deeply troubled by these people, and He shares His pain through His servants. He strongly desires that His people return from their fallen state.

Restoration Steps

Here are clear spiritual instructions on how to restore a dying or dead lamp. This is an excellent plan for how to shine again in our spiritual lives:

A. First, clean the lamp: If the lamp is dirty, it won't shine properly. Likewise, in our spiritual lives, we must first become pure and holy in God's presence.

- B. Fix the wick: If the wick is burnt and not right, the lamp can't give light. Likewise, we must fix the flaws in our character. We need to fix the pride, sin, and disobedience in us. We must become like clay in God's hands so He can shape us and fix our faults.
- C. Pour in oil: The lamp needs oil to burn. In spiritual life, we must pour in the oil of prayer. We must have a constant relationship with God through fasting, tearful prayers, and personal prayers. A life without prayer is like a lamp without oil.
- D. Light it again (with the Word):
 After pouring the oil, the lamp must
 be lit again. We must be re-lit with
 the Word of God. The Word of God
 is a "lamp to our feet and a light to
 our path." We must burn brightly in
 the Spirit again through the Word.

Also, some key practices are suggested for spiritual growth:

- * Quiet Time with God: Spending time alone with God and thinking about the Word.
- * Personal Bible Study (PBS) and Fellowship: Studying the Bible alone and having unity and friendship with other believers.
- * Attending Bible Studies and Camps: Taking part in classes and camps to learn God's Word and grow spiritually.

Why does God want to restore you?

It's not just for your own spiritual benefit. He wants to shape you into a leader. His plan is to make you a clean lamp that will be useful to many people. If you obey His will, God will surely do great things through you.

2. The Salvation of the Gentiles

Here, God's second concern—the salvation of souls—is clear. You should keep growing spiritually and physically where you are. However, this growth isn't just for you; God wants to make you a blessing to those around you.

If you look around your area, there are many colleges and outreach areas. In these places, there are many students and people who have never

heard the gospel. We have the great responsibility to share Christ's love and the way of salvation with them.

It took the Lord many years to fix your own personal spiritual life. Now, He expects the countless students and colleges that have never seen or been lit to receive light through you this year. The Lord Jesus Himself said, "You are the light of the world." Therefore, God wants you to be a light in your area, your college, and your workplace. This is the Lord's pain! Let us understand this pain and fulfill His will. God expects you to clean yourself up, become a light, and be a blessing to many. Amen!

Hurry is one of our great life struggles. Even when we slow down and make time for God, we still struggle to turn off our racing thoughts. Hurry quenches the Holy Spirit, so we must eliminate it and make time for sustained seekingand-listening prayer to experience God's love. Paul's prayer is that God would strengthen us with power through His Spirit in our inner being. He prays with all his energy that we would learn to read the Bible, pray, and integrate these truths into our hearts. This is the practice of biblical meditation. Paul's prayer is that we grasp the love of Christ, not merely God's love in general. He emphasizes Jesus's love for us to remind us to meditate on the cross. He prays that we might have the power of the Holy Spirit to experience God, so that we would grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ.

Therefore, we must pray regularly, read the Bible, study the Bible, listen and obey the voice of God, follow Jesus as our model, actively apply His teachings, seek fellowship

and witness, connect with other believers, share our faith, cultivate a heart of humility, and trust. By consistently engaging with these practices, you can cultivate a deeper, more personal relationship with Jesus, experiencing His love, grace, and guidance in your life. Knowing Jesus personally and experiencing His love is funda mental to Christian faith, offering profound transformation, purpose, and eternal life. It is a relationship that goes beyond intellectual knowledge or religious practices, deeply impacting one's spiritual life and transforming how one views oneself and the world. This personal relationship provides strength, forgiveness, and a sense of security, ultimately shaping one's identity and actions.

This love also inspires a desire to live a life that reflects His values and teachings. Through a personal relationship with Jesus, believers gain a deeper understanding of God's character, including His love, mercy, and grace. This knowledge helps believers to grow in their faith and align their lives with His will. A personal relationship with Jesus motivates believers to live out their faith authentically, demonstrating His love and teachings in their daily lives. This involves following His example, seeking to do His will, and sharing His message with others. Ultimately, knowing Jesus personally in our daily lives and experiencing His love is a powerful experience that transforms believers from the inside out, offering a life of purpose, hope, and eternal significance.

VII) Examples of How a Relation ship with Christ Changes Our Lives

A) St. Augustine: He was known as the world's greatest sinner. He became a saint through a spiritual transformation that led him to embrace Christianity and dedicate

his life to God's service. Christ is the reason for his changed life. Initially, he was a brilliant but worldly young man who lived a life of sin and embraced various philosophies before being deeply impacted by the writings of St. Paul. A pivotal moment occurred when he heard a child's voice chanting "Tolle, lege" (take up and read), which prompted him to open the Bible and read Paul's Letter to the Romans. This led to his conversion. His world was changed from sinner to saint. This is the power of Jesus Christ in his life. The world of Augustine was completely changed through the relationship between Jesus Christ and Augustine. The power of a relationship with Jesus Christ is immeasurable

B) George Whitefield: He was an Anglican evangelist and preacher whose "secret" lay in his powerful preaching and fervent evangelism, which ignited the First Great Awakening in the American colonies and beyond. He achieved this through a combination of captivating delivery, a focus on personal, experiential faith, and a commitment to applying biblical truths to everyday life. God's word changed his life to transform the American colonies. His relationship with Christ was amazing.

VIII) Seek a Deeper Connection with God Beyond Rituals

There are a few things that can distract us from a deeper connection with God, such as a lack of desire to know more about God, distractions from our intentions, an unwillingness to purge, the pain of past wounds, willfulness, pride, a sense of self-sufficiency, impatience, the need to know everything, people-pleasing, self-contentedness, and a love of materialism. Few obstacles cause us to keep away from God:

- a) The logical obstacle: Ques tions like, "How do you know the Bible is true?"
- b) The emotional obstacle: Pain can often keep us from belief.
- c) The behavioral obstacle: seeing that God is calling us to a holy life makes many people reject Jesus because they want to live by their own standards.
- d) The cultural obstacle: some of these barriers are false; being a Christian in America doesn't mean you are necessarily white, Republican, or conser vative. Every culture is called to account by Jesus.
- e) The spiritual obstacle: Only God the Holy Spirit can change a heart. Christians are called to make disciples, but we are not

capable of changing people. A spiritual war is taking place.

Conclusion

A deeper connection with Christ is about a personal, loving relationship, not just adherence to religious rituals. While rituals can be meaning ful expressions of faith, a true connection with Christ comes from faith, personal prayer, Bible study, and actively seeking to live according to His teachings. A personal relationship is more profound.

Focus on the heart, not just actions: God desires a relationship with our hearts, not just outward displays of religious behavior. Spiritual growth comes from faith in Christ, not simply performing rituals. A relationship with Christ is unique and personal, involving individual communication through prayer and reflection on His Word. These practices should flow from a genuine love for God and be an expression of that love, not a substitute for it.


A relationship with Christ has the power to transform a person's life, leading to personal growth, changed behavior, and a deeper understanding of God's will. As William Temple described, worshiping God with our whole being is the submission

of our entire being to God. It encompasses the quickening of conscience, the nourishment of the mind, the purification of imagination, the opening of the heart, and the surrender of the will. He emphasized that worship is more than just ritual; it is a deep, transformative experience that addresses self-contentedness and brings one closer to God. Therefore, we must surrender to Lord Jesus Christ with our conscience, mind, imagination, heart, and will through our deepest connection at His feet for His awesome glory at any cost in our lives. This is the ultimate meaning of our lives.

After becoming believers, many people are afraid to show their faith through actions and stay secret believers. However, the Bible says that faith without actions is useless (James 2:26).

Rahab, a Canaanite prostitute in the Book of Joshua, is a great example. She lived on the wall of the city of Jericho. She heard about God's amazing acts and put strong faith in Him. Because of this faith, she risked her life to hide two

Israelite spies. As a result, she and her family were saved.

In the Book of Exodus, two Hebrew midwives, Shiphrah and Puah, feared God and disobeyed the Pharaoh's order by letting the Israelite baby boys live. Because of this, God gave them families (Exodus 1:17, 21). In the same way, because Rahab hid the two spies and didn't fear the King of Jericho, she was able to live among the Israelites and start a new life.

Rahab's Faith in God's Promise

Joshua, son of Nun, secretly sent two men to spy on Jericho (Joshua 2:1-21). When they reached Rahab's house, she hid them under stalks of flax on her roof. Men sent by the King of Jericho searched her house for the spies but left when they didn't find them.

Rahab then talked to the spies and explained what she had heard about God's greatness and miracles. She told them that the people of Jericho were terrified after hearing about God's mighty acts in Egypt and his battles for Israel. She bravely stated her belief that the Lord is God in heaven above and on the earth below, and that no one could stand up to the Israelites.

She begged them not to destroy her and her family when they captured the city. They agreed and told her to tie a red cord in her window as a sign. She then helped them escape safely down the rope through the window.

The Fall of Jericho and Rahab's Rescue (Joshua 6:1-25)

Joshua and the priests carried the Ark of the Covenant and walked around Jericho once a day for six days. On the seventh day, they circled the city seven times. When the priests blew the trumpets and the people shouted, the walls of Jericho fell. Everyone went into the city and killed every person inside with a sword

However, the spies brought Rahab and all her family out. Then, the city was burned with fire. Only the silver, gold, bronze, and iron items were placed in the Lord's treasury. From that time on, Rahab lived among the Israelites.

Rahab's name isn't mentioned again in the Old Testament, but it appears in the New Testament in Matthew 1:5: "Salmon the father of Boaz, whose mother was Rahab." According to James 2:25, Rahab was considered righteous because of her actions. It is amazing that she lived among the Israelites and became the mother of Boaz, who is in the family line of Jesus Christ.

Lessons from Rahab's Life

- * Even though all the people of Jericho heard about the great things done by the Israelites' God, the Lord, no one else showed faith like Rahab did.
- * She risked her life to help God's people.
- * She started a new life based on her strong faith in God, and He gave her a good family.
- * As the wife of Salmon and

mother of Boaz, she understood God's plans and built a strong life and family.

- * It is truly a blessing that through Boaz, who was in the line of Elimelech-Perez, came Obed, Jesse, David, and finally Jesus Christ
- * Rahab didn't know the Law as well as the Israelites, but she was able to raise her son Boaz with great godly discipline.
- * Boaz grew up to be an honest, upright, and complete man. This shows how hard Rahab worked as a mother.
- * She didn't feel bad about her past life or blame her parents, but bravely moved forward with faith in God.
- * She followed the parts of the Law she knew and was newly learning, raising her son Boaz to have spiritual and moral values.
- * Rahab likely prayed that her past life and sins would not affect her son.
- She built her family on steady faith in God, without fear for the future
- * She ignored rumors, insults, rejection, shame, mockery, and ridicule, and kept moving forward.

Conclusion

After being saved, we shouldn't dwell too much on our past life or family background and be overcome with guilt. Satan may try to use others to remind us of our past and hurt us, but we must keep going with the certainty of God's Word. Rahab, who was a sinner, became a bright person, wife, and mother after being freed from sin.

By trusting God and welcoming the spies, she was not destroyed with the disobedient and was added to the list of heroes of faith (Hebrews 11:31). Although little is written about her in the Bible, looking at Boaz's life shows how hard she worked as a mother to raise him into a great man.

We should not look down on others because of their background or hurt them with mean words. If we do, God might give our blessings to others. When we show our faith through actions, God will use us for his work, no matter our past.

May we receive God's grace to raise our children in the fear and devotion of God, even if we face rejection because of our family background! May God give us all a faith that includes actions!

Biography



Bill Bright (1921-2003)

Founder of Campus Crusade

Campus Crusade for Christ has shared the Gospel and trained followers for Christ more than almost any other ministry in world history. The ministry's simple slogan is to 'Win, Build, and Send' college students for Christ.

This great organization started because one person obeyed God's call. Today, Campus Crusade works worldwide with over 25,000 staff and more than 500,000 trained volunteers.

The founder of this ministry was Bill Bright. He is considered one of the most influential evangelical leaders of the late 20th century.

Childhood and Education

William Bright was born in Coveta,

Oklahoma, on October 19, 1921. His mother dedicated him to God while he was in her womb. During childbirth, she promised God that if her baby was born healthy, she would dedicate him to God for any service based on the Lord's calling. In a way, Bill Bright was committed to ministry before he was even born.

Bright was used to hard work from childhood. Because his family's farm didn't have electricity, he worked hard on the farm even when he was little. Bright's humble, difficult upbringing affected him throughout his life.

He became known as a tireless worker. Compared to his fellow

evangelists, he lived a simple lifestyle. He followed the same standards that applied to all Campus Crusade staff. He didn't receive any royalties from his extensive writings. He never depended on others for money throughout his life.

Bright grew up in the small town of Covetta, where he went to a small Methodist church. But he didn't see religion as a very important part of his life. For Bright, working hard and being honest was more important than going to church. As a teenager, Bright thought Christianity was only for women and children, not for men.

Bright wanted to make a name for himself. However, good opportuni ties were limited in Oklahoma back then. After finishing high school, Bright decided to attend Northeastern State College. But he wasn't very interested in academics. He soon got busy with as many extra activities as possible. Bright played main roles in school plays, improved his public speaking as a member of the debate team, and grew his leadership skills as class president.

Bright wanted success and fame. He moved to Los Angeles, a good place for business. He decided to realize his dreams there.

Conversion Experience

In 1944, Bill Bright's move to the West Coast brought more blessings than he expected. Bright didn't go to the West Coast to find Jesus, but Jesus was already looking for Bill Bright.

His landlords there went to the Hollywood Presbyterian Church, which was the largest church in America at the time. Bright started going to the church with them.

All of Bright's ideas about Christianity and church life changed in a moment. Because the church members in his hometown of Covetta, Oklahoma, seemed simple and boring to him. But Bright was surprised to see famous movie stars in the Hollywood Presbyterian Church. Especially, one woman caught the young Bright's attention.

She was Henrietta Mears, a wealthy and influential leader in the church. She taught a Sunday school class. Her teachings inspired Bill Bright to learn about theology and teaching methods.

Mears knew many movie stars. She strongly believed in the power of the Bible, God's Word. That's why she invited German theologians to her house to study deep subjects in the Bible.

Henrietta Mears focused heavily on turning people toward Christ.

Her Bible lessons were long and interesting. After every session, she explained the message of salvation.

In that environment, Bill Bright saw a type of Christianity he hadn't imagined before. Influential people enthusiasti cally worshipped God, spent hours in Bible studies, and tried to live completely for Christ. All of this deeply affected the young Bill Bright.

In 1945, within a year of moving to Los Angeles, Bill Bright was completely changed by Mears' teachings.

Theological Studies

Bright became very active in the Hollywood Presbyterian Church. He met many famous people at that time. His sincerity, his desire to serve others, and his strong commitment to Christ impressed everyone. These qualities made him stand out.

Bright decided to dedicate his life to full-time ministry. In late 1945, he was appointed as a deacon in the church. To pursue ministry more formally, he decided to get training. With this goal, he went to Princeton Seminary in 1946.

At Princeton Seminary, Bright really liked classes on the Old and New Testaments. But he didn't like learning the Bible languages or studying Systematic Theology. This attitude lasted his whole life. That's why, even in his later writings, he wasn't able to explain his theological ideas in an organized way.

He loved the Scriptures deeply, but he didn't understand how theology classes could help him 'win' souls for Christ. That's why he left Princeton Seminary quickly and returned to Los Angeles. There, he focused on growing his small candy business.

Even so, Bright continued to serve as a deacon in his church. He also shared the Gospel widely in the areas around Los Angeles.

In 1946, a new seminary called Fuller opened in Southern California. Bill Bright decided to go back to seminary. He joined Fuller Seminary as a student in the first batch. There, he excelled at sharing his faith and church service. But he got very low marks in academics. Because of this, he was placed on academic probation at the end of the first semester.

Bright then told a professor, "When Christ comes, I'm not going to be sitting here studying Greek." Soon after, he left the seminary.

Ministry at Church and College Campuses

Bright returned to his business from the seminary and continued

his service as a deacon and elder at the church. During this time, he started visiting college campuses around Los Angeles with his former classmates from Fuller to preach the Gospel.

Fuller faculty noticed Bright's passion for sharing his faith and encouraged him toward a more effective ministry. In fact, despite being on probation for poor academic performance, the faculty decided to give him another chance to finish his degree. That's why they encouraged Bright to return to Fuller.

So, he went back to the school in 1950. However, Bright moved away from the idea of serving the church officially. Instead, he focused more than ever on reaching people, especially influential student leaders on college campuses.

Campus Crusade – Reaching College Campuses

Bright enrolled in Fuller Seminary, but his mind wasn't on his studies. He had a great hunger for souls. That's why he spent a lot of time sharing the Gospel and looking after his small business. Because of this, he spent less time on his schoolwork. As a result, in his third attempt, he failed both Greek and Hebrew at the seminary. He felt it was wrong to sit in a room studying

theology when thousands of people outside were going to hell.

It was during this time that Bright received a clear vision from God to start a ministry fully dedicated to reaching college campuses. This completely changed his life. Bright sat in Professor Wilbur Smith's office, lamenting his dislike for academic studies, but excitedly talking about the new college ministry God had called him to start. Professor Wilbur Smith encouraged Bright to pursue his dream. With Professor Smith's encouragement, Bright followed God's call. That's how Campus Crusade for Christ was born in 1951.

The Early Days of the Brights' Ministry

Bright and his wife, Vonette, gathered a group of friends in their kitchen. There, he made his plan for the ministry that was starting at the University of California – Los Angeles campus. Bright felt a deep command from the Holy Spirit that God wanted the Great Commission to be fulfilled through his generation. He clearly knew what that involved. He planned to use all the tools of technology to achieve it.

Bright strongly believed that if they could reach the college campus today, they could reach the world tomorrow. Because of their leadership poten tial, college students involved in Campus Crusade were later called the 'Powerful Percentage'. Bright continued his ministry with the idea of raising future leaders, training them, sending them out, and having them continue the same work wherever they went.

Bright never gave up on his life's mission. When asked, "If you had a chance to live your life over, what would you do differently?" Bright answered: "I would focus more on winning and training God's men and women whom He has already chosen and appointed as His representatives to the world. Spiritual multiplica tion is the key to changing the world."

This means Bright deeply under stood that God's Kingdom could only be quickly expanded by identifying and training those God had chosen to do His work. This points to the great idea of everyone working together to expand God's work, not just one person's effort. Bright believed that the Gospel would spread worldwide through the principle of this Spiritual Multiplication.

Conclusion

Bill Bright was a person who completely lived his life for the Lord. After fighting pulmonary fibrosis, a lung disease, for many years, he died on July 19, 2003. Bright continued his writing and teaching until his last breath. When his lungs failed, he recorded teaching messages through tubes about a wonderful Savior, even while breathing with the help of artificial lungs. Even though he was wheezing and breathing was difficult and slow, the Holy Spirit worked powerfully in him. In this way, Bill Bright was involved in God's service until the very last moment of his life.

Bill Bright's life is a great example for us. Like him, let's continue ministering to college students, following the Campus Crusade approach. Now is the right time to reach perishing students with the Gospel. How many of us have the dedication and commit ment to ministry that Bill Bright had? Let's do our part so that students can hear God's Gospel at least once before they leave campus.

The songs sung by the students were very meaningful. Afterward, two graduate brothers and two students shared how they were introduced to UESI and how they grew spiritually through it.


